#### THE CITY OF BRASOV

Brasov is located in the middle of Romania and is one of the most important industrial, cultural and scientific centres of Transylvania and of the entire country.

Situated 176 km north of the Romanian capital city Bucharest, Brasov is the capital of the county bearing the same name. The road connecting the two cities runs along the Prahova Valley, crossing Bucegi Mountains through the Pass of Predeal. Predeal is the town situated at the highest altitude in Romania. From Sinaia to Brasov travellers enjoy a spectacular mountain landscape.


In the Middle Ages, due to its strategic location the city of Brasov and its surroundings in the natural depression called Barsa Land, held an important economic, military and political role. The development of Brasov as an urban settlement had begun before the great Tatar invasion of 1241 and the colonization of Barsa Land with German population.

The earliest available documents testify to the existence of Brasov since 1234, under the name of "Corona" (Crown), hence its German name of "Kronstadt".

During feudalism the nucleus of the town, namely "the Citadel" was the centre of trades and cultural-administrative activities, looking similar to other European medieval towns. In the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries buildings bearing the hallmark of Baroque and Viennese Rococo styles began to mark the city's appearance. The oldest part of the town, Schei of Brasov, is dominated by the slim silhouette of St. Nicholas Church, a true cathedral of Orthodoxy, founded and restored over time by several princes from Wallachia and Moldavia. The still standing wooden gates and the roadside triptychs on the surrounding heights give the Schei a unique and special colour.

A visit to Brasov is an opportunity of direct contact with its cultural life. The statue of Johannes Honterus near the Black Church, by Finnish sculptor Haaro Magnusen shows the great humanist, deeply involved in the 16<sup>th</sup> century European movement of Enlightenment, who brought Protestantism to Brasov and authored notable pedagogical geographical writings.

Noteworthy in the yard of St. Nicholas Church, is the statue of deacon



Coresi, the first publisher of books in the Romanian language. His works, published after 1570, circulated in all lands inhabited by Romanians.

# TRANSILVANIA UNIVERSITY OF BRAŞOV

Brasov has one of the finest natural settings in Romania and Europe. The Southern part of the town is towered by 960 m high Mount Tampa, and about 10 km further begins the lovely winter and a summer resort Poiana Brasov.

Only 30 km South-West the Bran-Rucar corridor, the ancient commercial road that crosses the mountains from Transylvania to Wallachia, teems with tourists in all seasons, attracted not only by Bran castle, but also by the beauty of the scenery and healthy crisp mountain air. Agritourism, significantly developed over the last two decades offers tourists the opportunity of benefitting from local hospitality and tasting the very special cuisine of the region.



To the South-West, near the town of Zarnesti, Piatra Craiului, the most spectacular mountain in the country, while accessible to any tourist or hiker, offers challenging ascents to experienced mountaineers.

To the West rises the massif of the Fagaras Mountains, named the Alps of Transylvania by reputed French geographer de Martonne. They impress by their spectacular landscape, peaks that look like spires of Gothic cathedrals, glacial lakes at over 2000 m altitude, and hidden valleys where in some years skiing is possible even in July.

Contemporary Brasov, with a population of about 300000, is a busy industrial, shopping, tourist and cultural centre, a permanent attraction for hundreds of thousands of tourists from Romania and abroad. Those who at one time live in Brasov come to miss it and wish to return.



The beginnings and development of higher education in Brasov root in the town's cultural tradition and intensive cultural climate. Technical and scientific creation, rich artistic activity in a wealth of fields, mass culture, as well as quality teaching and study in schools of all levels blend together in harmony.

The most important landmarks of the beginnings and development of Brasov as a cultural town include the first Romanian School in the Schei of Brasov, founded about five centuries ago, deacon Coresi's first printings in Romanian

language, the Johannes Honterus German High School, the vast activity of the national Enlightenment movement led by George Baritiu, a famous Romanian man of letters, and "Gazeta de Transilvania" - the newspaper founded by him, the Astra cultural association known for its leading role in shaping national consciousness, personalities like Andrei Muresianu, Gheorghe Dima, Iacob Muresianu, Octavian Goga, St. O. Iosif, Sextil Puscariu, Valeriu Braniste, Tiberiu Brediceanu, Ilie Cristea and others.



#### TRANSILVANIA UNIVERSITY OF BRASOV

*Transilvania* University of Braşov is an accredited higher-education public institution. Its history began in 1948, when the Forestry Institute was established at Braşov. Since then, the institution has continuously developed, currently being the largest and the best reputed university in the region, consisting of 18 faculties, over 20.000 students and 788 academic staff members. Several milestone years should be mentioned:

- 1949 the Institute of Mechanics was established in Brasov, including only the Faculty of Mechanics; in 1953, the Faculty of Mechanical Technologies was established within the same institute;
- 1956 the Polytechnic Institute was established, by merging of the two higher education institutes (Forestry and Mechanics);
- 1960 the Institute of Pedagogy was set up, which in 1971 merged with the Polytechnic Institute, forming the University of Brasov. At that time, the University of Brasov consisted of eight faculties: four technical ones (Silviculture and Forest Exploitation, Mechanical Engineering, Manufacturing Engineering, Wood Engineering) and four non-technical ones (Mathematics and Informatics, Physics Chemistry, Natural and Farming Sciences, Music) becoming a reference point in the national academic environment;
- 1991 the university received its current name Transilvania University of Brasov;
- After 1990, the university has significantly diversified its educational offer, in accordance with youth educational needs and the requirements of the labour market;
- The faculties already existing in 1989 together with the newly established faculties and colleges were accredited in 1995;
- Currently the university has 18 faculties, offering academic degree programmes in a wide range of fields, developing research and providing lifelong learning programmes based on the societal request.

In order to meet the student educational needs as well as those of the labour market, the university has constantly widened and diversified its educational offer, so that every year new study programmes at all levels undergo national accreditation. This dynamic process is conducted



simultaneously with the analysis of all study programmes of the university, based on efficiency and performance criteria established at national and European framework reference level.

Transilvania University of Brasov takes full advantage of the academic autonomy. The first Charta of was devised in 1996 and amended in 2001. The present form of the Charta was approved by the University Senate in 2012.


### INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION WITHIN THE LIFE-LONG-LEARNING (LLP) FRAMEWORK

Socrates Programmes started at Transilvania University of Brasov in 1997, the year when the first Bilateral Agreements were signed with the partner institutions from European Union countries. 

#### 2.1. BEFORE LEAVING HOME

#### **HOW TO APPLY**

If your application to study at Transilvania University of Brasov has been approved by your home university, you should carefully fill in the Application Form for Transilvania University of Brasov, the Learning Agreement and the Application Form for Accommodation. These forms can be downloaded from: http://www2.unitbv.ro/erasmus.

The Application Form and the Learning Agreement must include an official institutional stamp and signatures of your Erasmus departmental and institutional coordinators.

The official teaching language at Transilvania University of Brasov is Romanian, but a growing number of courses are taught in English, German or French. As not all the incoming students are sufficiently proficient in Romanian, at the beginning of their study, Transilvania University requires good knowledge of English, in order to be able to communicate and function within the academic context. If you want to enrol for a course to learn Romanian, please fill in the relevant form which can be found on our website.

#### 2.2. UPON ARRIVAL

#### **HOW TO ARRIVE IN BRASOV**

#### (A) Arrival by plane

Brasov does not have a local airport. The closest airports are located in:

- Bucharest (OTP) 100 miles (165 km) South of Brasov www.otp-airport.ro/index.php
- Sibiu (SBZ) 85 miles (137 km) West of Brasov www.sibiuairport.ro
- Targu Mures (TGM) 105 miles (169 km) North of Brasov <a href="www.targumuresairport.ro">www.targumuresairport.ro</a> If you land in Bucharest Henry Coanda airport (former Otopeni airport OTP) you should take the bus service from the airport to the centre of Bucharest or to Gara de Nord railway-station (Central Train Station) than choose one of the trains bound for Brasov Central Station.

#### (B) Arrival by train

If you come by train from Western Europe, you will arrive at the Central Station in Brasov, as all international trains from Paris, Berlin, Munich, or Vienna to Bucharest stop in Brasov. INTERCITY (Express) service is provided between Bucharest and Brasov (approximate journey time: 2 ½ hours).

Once arrived in Brasov take buses no. 4, 50 or 51 from the bus stop in front of Central Station, toward the centre of the city. The bus stops at the University Rectorate building, where the Erasmus Office is located.

#### (C) Arrival by car

From any of the towns at the Hungarian-Romanian border follow the corresponding international road to Bucharest, which passes through Brasov (either Nadlac – Arad – Deva – Sibiu – Brasov or Bors – Oradea – Cluj-Napoca – Sighisoara – Brasov).

The recommended route from **Budapest to Brasov is E75 - E68:** Budapest — Szeged — Nadlac — Arad — Deva — Alba Iulia — Sibiu — Fagaras — Brasov.

The recommended route from **Bucharest to Brasov is E60:** Bucharest – Ploiesti – Sinaia – Predeal – Brasov

#### **Erasmus registration**

The registration takes place at the Erasmus Office, upon your arrival in Brasov. For registration, all Erasmus students are required to present the following documents to the Erasmus Office:

- your passport (and required visa if you come from a country outside EU) or any other identity document;
- one passport photo for your student card;
- your European Health card or proof of private health insurance if you come from a country outside EU;
- car insurance and driving license, if you arrive in your own car.

#### 2.3. BEFORE LEAVING BRASOV

#### WHAT TO DO

- 1. Fill in your Termination Form, get it signed by the authorized persons and present it at the Erasmus Office, one week before your departure.
- 2. Ask your Departmental Erasmus Coordinator to issue a statement about your activity in Brasov (examinations, seminars, project work etc.). In case the results and the grades of your evaluation have not been issued before your departure, they will be sent to your university at a later time (Transcript of Records).
- 3. A written report from you on your experience during your stay in Brasov would be very welcome at the Erasmus Office.

#### 3. STUDENT LIFE IN TRANSILVANIA UNIVERSITY OF BRASOV

#### **ACADEMIC CALENDAR**

\* Deadlines for applications are the  $15^{th}$  of August (for the  $1^{st}$  semester) and the  $15^{th}$  of January (for the  $2^{nd}$  semester).

The academic year is divided into two semesters, separated by an one week holiday in February.

The academic year begins on the 1<sup>st</sup> of October and has the following structure:

#### **HEALTH INSURANCE**

We strongly recommend that you get health insurance to cover your study period in Romania. For students from EU member states, medical care in Romania is provided based on the European Health Insurance Card. If you are a non-EU national, you should inquire whether there is a bilateral agreement on health care between Romania and your country.

If find yourself in need of medical assistance, you can go to any authorized medical unit, public or private. Some private health insurance companies will refer you to a specific clinic or hospital that they have a contract with. Ask your insurance company to give you the list of all medical units they are working with.

\* Medical Insurance is to be paid in each applicant's native country. In Romania, Emergencies are free of charge.

#### **VISA REQUIREMENTS**

The following information is valid for both exchange and independent students.

Nationals of EU and EEA member states and from certain non-EU and non-EEA (Norway, Island and Lichtenstein) countries are exempted from visa requirements. As a student coming from one of these countries, you can enter the territory of Romania by only showing your passport or identity card and you can reside here for up to 90 days.

Nationals of all the other countries must apply for a study visa in due time, at a Romanian diplomatic mission or consular office in their native countries. In order to get the necessary papers for visa extensions, you should contact our International Relations Office, after your arriving here. The Romanian visa for Erasmus students is free of charge.

Students who will reside in Romania for more then 90 days, need to apply for a **residence permit.** Within 15 days after the arrival to Romania, the student has to report to the Foreigners' Registration Office in order to obtain the residence permit (the residence permit is issued for maximum 1 year).

#### The following documents are needed when applying for a residence permit:

- Certificate issued by the Erasmus Office of Transilvania University of Brasov (within one week);
- ID card / passport (original + 1 copy);
- The European Health card or a medical certificate (for non-EU students) issued by the Student Health Centre from Transilvania University of Brasov;
- A statement about your source of financing covering the costs of your stay in Romania (you will receive the statement form ("Declaratie" at the police office);
- One photo;
- your lease agreement or contract;
- One folder and a fiscal stamp, which is 4 lei ( $\approx$  1 Euro).

No other taxes have to be paid.

The document will be delivered within few days.

#### LIVING IN BRASOV

For exchange students, no tuition fee is required by Transilvania University of Brasov. The following information should give you an idea of the average cost of living in our country. The amounts may, however, vary according to your personal lifestyle.

#### **MEALS**

If you are living in the University Campuses (Colina or Memo) you will find it convenient to have lunch at the Student Refectory (Cantina studențească), for  $\approx$  2-3 euros/meal. The Student Refectories are very close to the Memo and Colina Halls of Residence.

There are evidently many restaurants in town that offer more varied meals from a wide range of European, Asian, Italian or Mexican cuisines, for  $\approx$  5-20 euros/meal

Food markets and supermarkets are opened every day, located in practically all parts of the town, where you can get fresh vegetables, fruits, meat, eggs or cheese.

#### **ACCOMMODATION**

#### University campus accommodation

Accommodation arrangements should be made in advance by filling in the Student Accommodation Request Form and sending it to the Erasmus Office (<a href="mailto:erasmus@unitbv.ro">erasmus@unitbv.ro</a>). University halls of residence:

- Memorandului Student Halls of Residence (Memo): 50-60 euros/month/room;
- Colina Student Halls of Residence: 60-70 euros/month/room.

Student Halls of Residence have 2-person-rooms and 3-4-person rooms in suits, endowed with: beds, other furniture, sink, shared bathroom, free Internet access. No kitchens are available.

! Please note that if someone wishes to book a room just for herself/ himself, she/he must pay the entire price of the room (also for the non-existing roommates).

#### Renting an apartment

If you choose to rent an apartment or a house in Brasov, we strongly advise you to contact a real-estate agency (agenție imobiliară). They can provide you with information about the most interesting offers on the market.

The cost of accommodation varies with the type, location, size and facilities, approximately 150-300 euros/month/apartment. Usually, you have to pay extra for all utilities: water, electricity, gas, telephone, etc., about 50 euros/month.

A deposit representing the rent for the first three months is usually required. It will be refunded at the end of your stay, provided that you leave the apartment in good condition.

**REMEMBER!!** If you decide to rent an apartment, it is imperative that you **sign a lease contract** (also you will be required to pay the real estate agency a commission of typically 50% of one monthly rent) and have it registered it with the administration, because you will need it in order to apply for the temporary residence permit.

#### **LOCAL TRANSPORT**

The Brasov **public transport** network is very extensive and services run late into the night; specialized all-night services are also available.

Tickets can be bought at specialized RATBv kiosks or from newsagents, but remember to punch them in the bus. Even though there are no ticket gates when entering the vehicles, it's advisable to have a valid ticket because ticket inspections are frequent. When someone requests your ticket, always ask to see an ID.

A monthly pass is about 80 LEI (about 20 EUROS). One bus/trolley bus 2-way ticket: 4 LEI

**Taxis** are a faster and more comfortable way to get around town than public transport. Taxis are also relatively cheap. Most taxis have meters and drivers are usually friendly. Ask the approximate fare in advance and always make sure the driver uses the meter from the start, or agree on a fixed amount for the ride. Tipping taxi drivers is not very common, but it is always appreciated.

Taxis are usually parked in designated areas, which are in the proximity of bus stations or other busy spots.

When travelling outside city limits, you may be asked to pay the double fare per km (it is considered acceptable), or you could agree on a fixed amount in advance.

Never get into a taxi that does not have a sign with the company name on top.

Outside Brasov, you can travel by train, bus or Maxi Taxi, which is actually a van.

For train services visit: www.cfr.ro

Maxi Taxis are very popular, because they are cheaper than the train, fast enough, have more buses available than trains; for example, for Brasov-Bucharest they leave every half hour. Usually Maxi Taxi stations are next to the Central Railway Stations.

#### **CURRENCY**

The Romanian official currency is the LEU (pl. LEI). 1 LEU has 100 BANI.

The exchange rate is established by the National Bank. The current exchange rate is about: 1 EURO = 4.38 LEI

It is advisable to exchange money at banks or at Exchange offices available all around the city. It is illegal to exchange money on the street interacting with private persons.

You can use your foreign debit card at ATMs and you will be issued the equivalent in Lei of the amount of Euros or US dollars indicated by you. Romanian ATMs only accept Visa, MasterCard and Maestro. Depending on your needs, there are several possibilities for money transfer: postal money order ("mandat poştal"), bank transfer or special transfer (such as Western Union).

#### **ANNUAL EVENTS IN BRASOV**

Brasov has established a tradition of hosting a number of annual festivals, which spice up the cultural life of the city:

- **The Jazz and Blues Festival** an international festival hosted by Sica Alexandrescu Theatre, in autumn
- The International Chamber Music Festival held in September, organized by the Philharmonic Orchestra of Brasov
- The Contemporary Drama Festival held yearly in November; it is host to Romania's most important theatre companies, as well as to those from countries like France, Italy, USA, Belgium, Sweden, Brazil etc.
- **EtNovember** a cross between the words "ethnic" and "November", the name of Brasov's Etnovember festival reflects both the cultural traditions of the participating communities, and the month in which the festival is held

- The International Book Fair hosted by Transylvania University of Brasov, in March; it is an opportunity to find out about the latest books and also listen to quality music
- The Junii Feast is a unique event, which takes place on the first Sunday after Easter. Junii, the inhabitants of the old Schei district of Brasov, dress up in their traditional costumes, mount their horses and form a procession that passes through the old city streets, up to the so-called "Intre chetri" (Between the Rocks), where their ritual starts. There is dancing, barbecuing and much more. The costumes the Junii wear are very picturesque.
- The Golden Stag Festival an international pop music festival
- The National Lied Festival was initiated in 2003 by the internationally famous soprano, Mariana Nicolesco. Young artists compete against each other, while well-known artists give recitals.
- The International Opera Festival an annual event organised since 2003. The first edition marked the 50-year anniversary of the Brasov Opera.
- The Beer Festival a kind of local Oktoberfest usually organised in autumn. Several beer companies offer their products in dozens of tents. You will be also able to get a taste of "mici" (grilled small Romanian sausages) and other traditional food. Local and national bands and artists of all persuasions take the stage
