


# VISUAL IMPRESSIONS OF INTERCULTURAL ENCOUNTERS

# **CULTURE SHOCKED!**

# Visual Impressions of Intercultural Encounters

This comic contains fifty original illustrations celebrating the cultural diversity of the University of Limerick (UL). It came to life with the participation of current students, staff and alumni. Over the last twelve months or so, individuals of all backgrounds responded to an open call inviting them to share personal anecdotes of cultural misunderstandings or 'critical incidents' as we call them in the field of cross-cultural communication, i.e. observations of challenges that are commonly experienced when we interact with cultures other than our own. Following a mindful selection and some editing, five illustrators turned the testimonies into light-hearted artworks.

'Culture Shock' is a term coined by anthropologist Dr Kalervo Oberg to describe the loss of points of reference when confronted with unfamiliar ways of doing things and the adjustments we make in order to cope. It felt adequate to use a variation of the term to depict the various feelings of confusion communicated to the team for the purpose of the project. We have all experienced this to some degree - either as new incoming students arriving in Ireland or indeed Limerick for the first time, going on CoOp (Cooperative Education Programme) or on a Study-Abroad exchange, and increasingly in our everyday lives.

In my role as University Teacher in the School of Modern Languages and Applied Linguistics, I see immense value in examining these critical incidents with my students. They offer us opportunities to reflect on our behaviours and attitudes. We are not always conscious that our 'norms' are the product of our upbringing, our socialisation, and our habituation to a particular culture. These include the words we speak, the manner in which we greet individuals, the way we dress, our non-verbal cues (think gestures, facial expressions, and eye contact), our relationship with time, and the beliefs that guide our everyday life. The study of cultural misunderstandings can be an effective pedagogical tool in transforming attitudes towards otherness, developing empathy, and being better prepared for future intercultural encounters.

The anecdotes portrayed in the comic illustrate various levels of cultures. Some represent differences noted between entire countries or world regions. Such is the case in THE BILL where two visitors from Northern America wait for a bill that never comes after a meal in an Italian restaurant because they are not accustomed to ask for it. Other stories are more localised; they highlight variations that are observable in smaller communities. LIFE AND DEATH illustrates a superstition from the West of Ireland that may be unknown to a number of Irish individuals, including people from this very part of the country.

Given the context of the project, we also chose to illustrate some elements particular to UL's culture. Some of these are self-explanatory while others are likely to be incomprehensible to 'outsiders'. Here are some pointers for those who need them.

The university campus is big, very big: 367 acres of land crossed by the River Shannon. Many enjoy its stunning views

and rich wildlife especially when using 'The Living Bridge - An Droichead Beo', a unique design by Wilkinson Eyre Architects that mirrors the river with its flowing lines. THE LIVING BRIDGE describes how some people are taken aback by its movement and feel dizzy when many people step on it at the same time.

Because of the size of the university grounds, it can be challenging to make it to class in time in the allocated 10 minute-gap between lectures. It is not uncommon to arrive late and/or out of breath, as if you just had a workout as we see in GET YOUR STEPS IN.

UL has many recognisable landmarks thanks to some bold architectural choices such as an inclined glass structure at the front of the Main Building locally known as the *ski slope* that appears in TOLERANCE TO COLD and SCATTERED SHOWERS. The same MAIN BUILDING is a testament to 1970s Brutalist architecture but is also infamous for its complex floor level system. Many have lost their way in its intricate and labyrinthine corridors as forewarned by ENTER IF YOU DARE.

There are also many distinctive outdoor sculptures scattered throughout the campus. The most famous one is probably 'Together and Apart', a cast iron figure by Antony Gormley, that features in BROWN THOMAS, SCATTERED SHOWERS, and SACRED STATUE. Variously nicknamed Rusty Man or Brown Thomas it reportedly caused some confusion when a meetup was scheduled at the Limerick Brown Thomas department store. Another iconic sculpture 'Geometric Forms' by

Alexandra Wejchert is located outside the Robert Schuman Building. Some eagle-eyed viewers may spot the structure in SCATTERED SHOWERS.

Lastly, many people in the university have achieved legendary status. Some are mentioned or represented in the illustrations like Richie, the local aerobics' instructor in GET YOUR STEPS IN. The heart-warming service staff in the library café known as the Pink Ladies because of their bright and colourful uniform feature in their own THE PINK LADIES. The ordinary Samaritan (nearly anyone working or studying in UL) who helps you find your way when you are utterly lost or holds the door open for you even if you are twenty feet away is the star of THE SPIRIT OF KINDNESS.

I hope you enjoy the stories in this comic and that they encourage you to appreciate the differences and similarities that we all carry and share.

N.B. While the essence of the stories has been maintained, some testimonies have been shortened and others expanded to keep a clear narrative and bring out the humour in the situations depicted. All characters have been created to showcase our community's diversity and are not representative of the actual individuals who shared the anecdotes.

#### Which anecdote did you enjoy drawing the most and why?



#### What is your motto in life?


Everything that happens leads me to where I need to be.

#### Do you have a personal intercultural encounter to share?






## TWO SUGARS

# Which anecdote did you enjoy drawing the most and why?



# Do you have a personal intercultural encounter to share?






