Exchange between civil societies is crucial for European cohesion.

The Goethe-Institut, town twinning, international schools and interuniversity collaboration play an important part in this.

You play a very important part in this.

On behalf of the Federal Foreign Office, I would like to thank you for all you do.

I know that you work closely with our Embassy in Dublin. You regularly organise joint events, such as the poetry project Dánnerstag.

The programme of your 25th Anniversary Conference shows the wide range of your interest: from language and music to photography.

I would like to thank all of you for your tireless commitment:

and of course, two people in particular:

- Professor Joachim Fischer, co-founder and Deputy Director of the Centre,
